1. Housing

1. Needs to be adequate, safe, affordable
2. Access to housing for all – upgrade slums

2. Transport

1. Safe, affordable, accessible, sustainable
2. Special attention paid to the needs of the vulnerable

3. Planning

1. Participatory, integrated, sustainable, inclusive
2. 3Es – equity, economy, environment

4. Heritage

1. Cultural and natural (within cities)
2. Protect and safeguard

5. Disasters

1. Reduce # deaths and people affected
2. Focus on vulnerable populations

6. Environmental impact

1. Reduce per capita impact
2. Focus on air quality and waste management

7. Green and public spaces

1. Safe, inclusive, accessible
2. Focus on accessibility for women, children, elderly and disabled

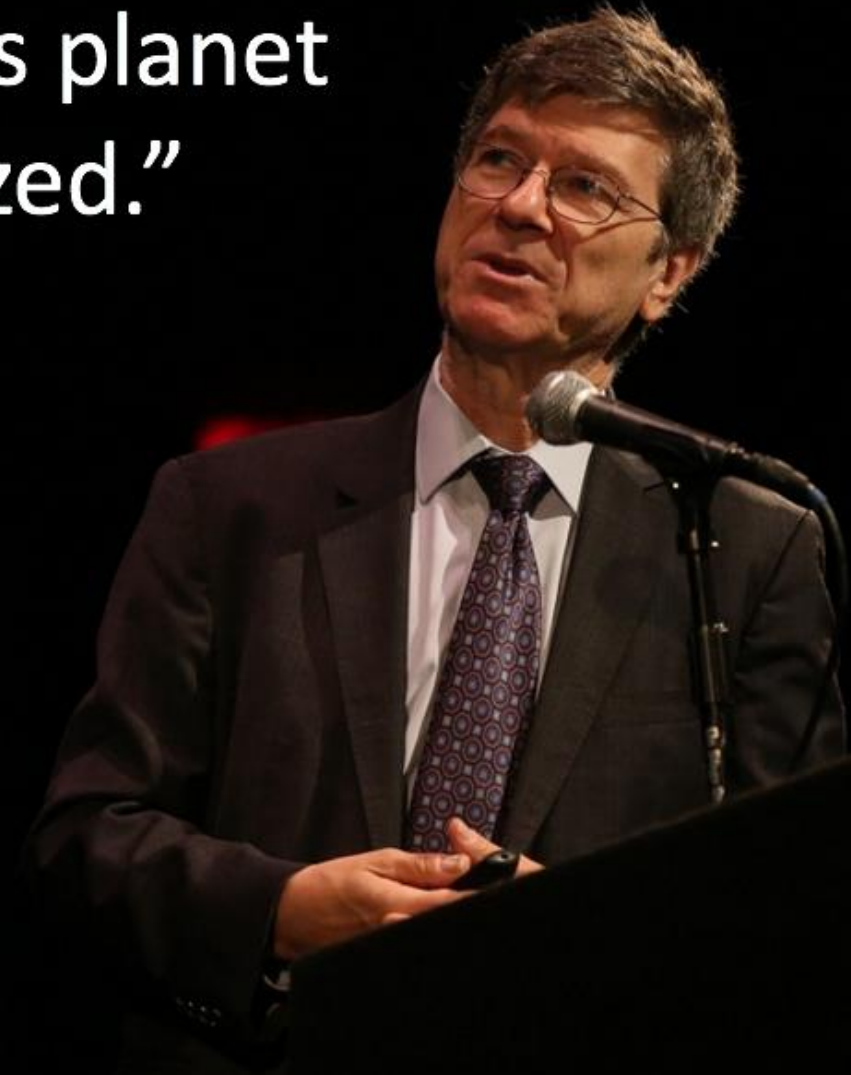

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Side-Event Details

1. Civil society engagement
 1. Need official consultations, regular meetings, conferences
 2. CIVICUS – great organization you can join as a free member to join conversations etc.
 3. Civil society organizations can act as watch-dogs for development – ensure that government is doing their part as well
2. Data revolution
 1. For example, there was an 8.4 million people survey (biggest ever) that brought to light a lot of issues that made it to the SDG agenda
 2. Need data to track progress
 3. Need to leverage data that already exists
3. Private investment should be rerouted and steered towards achieving social impact
4. Fight corruption
 1. Up to 90% of ODA is lost to corruption
5. USAID – calls for rapid inclusive growth underpinned by strong institutions and ethical governance
 1. Institutions are where the rubber hits the road
 2. But governance is key to ensure success
