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# FROM THE DIRECTOR

The Board is always looking for activities that will capture the interest and appeal of the APA membership. In May we will be co-sponsoring a somewhat different event: an open house of probably the only Victorian house in northern California in its original condition, unaltered and with its original furnishings.

Completed in 1858, the Alfred H. Cohen house was a gift to the newly wed Emma Bray and Alfred H. Cohen. In those days, families unable to build in San Francisco the generously styled homes of their imaginations and big families came to the East Bay, and to the pastoral area of open meadows, fruit orchards and oak groves. The Bray family did just that and build their home in "Fruit Vale." Many friends and neighbors in large and comfortable homes surrounded by spacious grounds, gardens and outbuildings, lived near enough for a lively social round of picnics, dinners, and singing around the piano.

Today, the 17-room, bracketed stick-style redwood Victorian house is one of the last of the original homes built in the Fruitvale area in that period. Now Fruitvale is a district in the City of Oakland and, except for this one relic of rural days, is an urban community, crowded and closed in by business, apartment houses and small homes.

Miss Emelita Cohen, born and raised in the home, remembers well the beauty and graciousness of those days and the changes that have since taken place. Once on a 200 acre farm, the Cohen house remains, in all its glory, on one last acre.

Unemployment also increased meeting attendance as people who never before attended APA functions came to "network." A frequent question planners ask is the equivalent of "how do I get off a sinking ship?" Alternate carreers for planners is a topic the Section must address. Planning will always be as much art as science and most vulnerable to the whims of fashion finance. We plan because we feel called to something greater than ourselves; wealth is not the aim, although we hope to avoid poverty. People will continue to study acting, voice and planning because that is the bottom line in their lives. APA's job is to support planners in their struggles, shine light into unexplored areas, and help us when the day comes that we can't do it anymore. Our new leaders in this Section must look at old questions in new ways and hang in there when their only conclusion is that "it's a puzzlement."


