On October 25, 1988 at the CCAPA Conference in Palm Springs, Chapter awards will be given for Historic Planning Landmarks. Between now and July 22, I will be working with the Nor-Cal Board and Section members to prepare a list of local projects. To qualify, a nomination must meet the following criteria:

All nominations must be for either a person and his or her work, or for a project approved by a government agency:

- Designed or prepared by a planner or a planning agency;
- A minimum of 25 years old;
- Considered as making a significant contribution to the community;
- A pioneering work, historical, unique, used as a precedent for other work in California and the nation; and

- Available for public use and viewing.

Northern Section Jointly-Sponsored One Day Workshop -- August 12th

THE BUCK STOPS WHERE: THE CITY OR THE DEVELOPER?

The California Chapter of the American Planning Association, the Building Industry Association of California and the San Mateo County Economic Development Association will co-sponsor a full day conference on fiscal planning from the developer's point of view as well as the city's perspective. The purpose of the workshop is to educate those in the public sector regarding the fiscal realities of development projects and to address the fiscal and financial concerns of government/public facility planning in California today. The workshop is intended to devote approximately half a day to each of these topics reserving approximately an hour at the end of the day to entertain questions and statements regarding the issues which emerge. The conference is being promoted to various groups in both the planning and construction industry. The \$65.00 per person cost includes all handouts and materials, luncheon and coffee service during the morning and afternoon breaks.

A full day workshop is scheduled in Southern California at the Los Angeles Hyatt Regency (located at LAX Airport) on August 5, and at the Marriott Airport Hotel (located at the San Francisco Airport) on August 12. The keynote speaker at the Northern California event will be Dan Walters, author of The New California; Facing the 21st Century which is perhaps today's best statement on the sociological and economic changes occurring in California today and into the next decade. Mr. Walters is a nationally sought after speaker who offers tremendous insight into the dynamics of social and economic change in the State of California.

Seminar facilitators will deal with the fiscal implications to cities and counties of development proposals and the fi-

nancial implications of development impact fees upon developers. The developer has a system for identifying whether a project works; the cities are starting to do the same when reviewing the projects, especially large scale projects that are going to take place within its boundaries. The purpose of completing these studies for both the developer and the jurisdiction is to identify whether the project will result in a negative drain on resources.

The workshop promises to bring technical/fiscal considerations on the part of developers and communities into discussion. The topic will also address the question whether economic development priorities of the private development community and jurisdictions can be successfully combined to the benefit of both.

Seminar Studied Campus Planning

About thirty people enjoyed the interaction provided at the Campus Planning Seminar held on April 28th at the San Mateo County Office Building in Redwood City. Since there was a full slate of six panelists, a challenging and interesting agenda followed the wine and cheese opening.

The seminar focused on "How the Differing Agendas of the University and Community Create both Problems and Opportunities." Phil Williams, Stanford Campus Planning Director, and Dorothy Walker, UC Berkeley Community Affairs Director opened the program with discussion of current campus planning issues and the differences that being a public or private university, and different land use densities made in handling day-to-day interaction with the community.

Ken Schreiber, Palo Alto Planning Director and Marge Macris, Planning Director for the City of Berkeley, followed with their communities' handling of such "town and gown" conflicts as adding academic facilities, providing adequate housing, handling parking and traffic problems, and zoning, to name a few.

In turn, two County planners adjacent to Stanford, Juanell Waldo of Santa Clara County, and Kim Vogl with San Mateo County described the County interaction with the campus planning process.

In closing arguments and audience participation, it was pointed out how much the two universities and town counterparts mirrored each other, and the ways in which similar situations were effectively resolved even though the campuses were different in age, density and size. There also has been some interest expressed in having the proceedings published at a later date.

UP is Beautiful

"Urban Renewal Tour on the right," yelled the tour guide at a conference in L.A.

"Historic preservation on the left."

Behind her in the shadows an oliveskinned man in a beige leisure suit shook his head and mumbled to nobody in particular.

"Both are futile," he said.

If planners are on "The Far Side" of City Hall, F.M. Esfandiary is on "The Far Side" of Planning. A professor with the Extension Program at UCLA, he has become known for his far-ranging social commentary described in a trilogy of paperbacks entitled *Optimism One*, *Up-Wingers* and *Telespheres*.

Esfandiary speaks of the next twenty years (the "Age of Breakthroughs") from a perspective that is radically different from the traditional view. Instead of predicting shortages and encouraging constraints like many of his peers, Esfandiary preaches about the coming "Age of Limitless Abundance and Growth." He thinks urban renewal is a "colossal farce" which merely "shores up obsolescence." He advocates building new, "instant telecommunities" made with synthetic materials, incorporating renewable energy sources.

"We speak of preserving historical landmarks in the cities," states Esfandiary in *Up-Wingers*. "The cities themselves are now historical landmarks. We should leave them as they are — and get out."

A former employee of the United Nations, he claims to be equally at home in many far-flung parts of the world. He predicts revolutions in communication that will provide the opportunity for instant global referendums, rendering our representational system of government obsolete. His forecast of electronic "tele-democracy" without politicians has brought skepticism.

To express his theories to others, Esfandiary has created his own vocabulary with a grammatical style devoid of commas to "bypass the plodding pace of print." In so doing, he creates "brief crisp rapid bursts of ideas intended to inform goad provoke catalyze..." He also uses new terminology to introduce new ideas , such as Earthnicity (planet Earth provincialism), and Unilang (formerly called English — "in our global age, national languages will be Kaput.")

Esfandiary is not concerned about the disparity between futurists, some of whom he considers anti-future, and present oriented planners. "Some are cautious, some are revolutionary, some are optimistic, some are pessimistic. Some are Right, others are Left. I am Up."

Such pessimistic outlooks would include the 1988 State of the World Population Report, which concurs with the historic 1972 Club of Rome computerized study, The Limits of Growth , which concluded that "if the present trends in world population, industrialization, pollution, food production and resource depletion continue unchanged, the limits of growth will be reached sometime within the next 100 years, resulting in a rather sudden and uncontrollable decline in both population and industrial capacity." These and other dismal projections led to the advent of Schumaker's "Small is Beautiful" philosophy.

Optimists like Esfandiary scoff at such projections. As K. William Knap of Basel University observes, "if there had been a computer in 1872, it might have predicted that by now there would be so many horse-drawn vehicles it would be impossible to clear up all the manure."

"Small is not beautiful,: says Esfandiary. "There are no limits to growth. The only limits are in some people's imagination and vision.
