Well, how's this grab you - would you like the resources of an international planning conference available to you any day, any time, without any handshakes or pressure to stay longer than you'd like? Would you like to give a presentation on a topic of your choice to an audience of thousands - without leaving your desk or even registering your talk? Would you like to listen to an ongoing seminar and ask questions whenever they occur to you? 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# A Planner's Introduction to Marsh Hydrology: Geomorphic and hydrologic rationale for tidal marsh restoration of the Sonoma Baylands.



The Sonoma Baylands, once part of an extensive tidal wetland system along the north margin of San Pablo Bay east of the Petaluma River, was diked for agriculture in the late 1800's. Since the area was diked, up to 6 feet of subsidence has occurred due to oxidation of the organic matter and dewatering of the surface soil. The California State Coastal Conservancy and the Sonoma Land Trust initiated a restoration design study in 1991 for a 322 acre portion of the Sonoma Baylands (the restoration project recently has been given final approval by the Corps of Engineers, a partner in the final construction process). The design study investigated the feasibility of utilizing clean dredged material from the Port of Oakland to raise the elevation of the area before breaching the dikes to restore tidal action. Our design process developed a clear definition of the biologic restoration goals and then

developed geomorphic and hydrologic guidelines to provide the physical characteristics of the tidal marsh to restore natural tidal wetland functions to the Sonoma Baylands.

In order to develop the geomorphic and hydrologic rationale for restoration of the Sonoma Baylands using dredged material, we needed to have a good understanding of the physical evolution of tidal marshes. The processes of marsh plain accretion, slough channel development, and vegetation establishment occur simultaneously and evolution of the complex physical and biologic characteristics of a tidal marsh are mutually dependent. The geomorphic criteria for the design included determination of the maximum elevation for placement of dredged material that would create the physical conditions necessary for successful restoration of the tidal marsh system by allowing natural sedimentation to raise the marsh plain after the dikes are

information databases. These BBS's provide access to electronic mail, forums on a diverse range of topics, information libraries and public domain software. There are a number of publications available both free and at a modest cost with information on how to access these BBS's and databases.

Most on-line services are accessed in one of several ways: through a personal computer with a modem connection to public telecommunication lines, through a computer "workstation" located at or affiliated with a governmental, educational, or corporate institution that is connected to the Internet, or through a public terminal located in a library, shopping center, cafe, or other public spaces. For an individual operating a personal computer (whether Macintosh, Unix or DOS based), you need a modem and a software communications package known as a terminal program. Modems and terminal programs vary in speed and quality. While you can access some services using basic terminal programs, such as Microsoft Terminal which comes free with Windows, using the software designed for a particular carrier can make life easier.

You may opt to subscribe to a commercial carrier, such as CompuServe or America Online, to get access to the Internet and other services provided by those carriers. At this writing, the only way to access the Internet is through a subscription to one of the commercial carriers licensed to sell connections to the Internet.

Without a subscription to a commercial carrier you can still access a variety of on-line services, including e-mail, through independent bulletin boards operated locally and around the nation. Many BBS's are free; however access fees (usually under \$50 dollars per year) are becoming more common. The best source of information on local BBS's is the *Bay Area Bulletin Board Advisor*. (Internet address: BABBA@NETCOM.COM; local BBS address: 408 946 8592 via modem.)

Electronic communication among planners has increased dramatically in recent years at both the national and state levels. Nationally, CompuServe's "Planners Forum", residing in Section 10, "Municipal Planning" of the Legal Forum, supports the largest group of on-line planners. Users of this service have access to a planning library that includes years of Planning Magazine indexes, APA Plan/Alerts, and numerous articles, essays and on-line discussions posted

by "forum" users. This professional forum also supports real-time "conference discussions," individual electronic mail accounts, and long term discussion and commentary on planning issues by professionals, academicians, and other interested users around the world.

Recent discussions on the "public bulletin board" have addressed the implications of large lot zoning, the increasing popularity of home occupations, and resources for economic development in small towns. Usenet, a network now part of the Internet, supports a planning "newsgroup" similar in functionality to CompuServe's "Planners Forum." Other commercial carriers including America Online and Delphi support planning related clubs and forums.

Many independent bulletin boards of interest to planners have been established around the nation, including Greenpeace's Environet, The American Institute of Architects' AIA On-line, and the National Trust for Historic Preservation's Preserve Link. Government agencies such as HUD and the EPA also operate numerous "free" bulletin boards - you only pay for the cost of the call.

Cities throughout California are leading a national trend toward increasing public access and interaction, and reducing vehicle trips, through electronic communication. Existing on-line services in Santa Monica, Diamond Bar, and Cupertino provide forums for discussion of local issues and allow access to council agendas, staff reports, library catalogs, and job listings. In Sacramento and San Diego counties, bilingual video kiosks at grocery stores, shopping malls, and government offices provide a variety of services including help with government applications. In the Bay Area, several firms are developing on-line services for local governments including multimedia software to assist users with city permitting and other forms, and computerized zoning ordinances, comprehensive plans, and other regulatory documents that are electronically linked to mapping systems.

For the planner of the future, gaining access to existing on-line systems may prove to be an innovative and valuable tool in exchanging information, discussing new problems and issues with other planners across the country, finding solutions to issues faced in your own

breached. A functioning slough channel system in a tidal marsh is critical for tidal circulation and for maintaining a salinity balance and is one of the conditions necessary for successful restoration of a tidal marsh. Using dredged material would accelerate the evolution of the ecosystem by reducing the time required to raise the marsh plain. Other important physical design criteria included minimization of wind fetch to control erosion, and the dimensions of the levee breach.

In our development of the restoration design guidelines for the Sonoma Baylands we learned from the example of other natural tidal marshes and marshes restored using dredged material in San Francisco Bay. Field surveys and aerial photographs of tidal marshes restored using dredged material indicated that when dredged material was initially placed too high, at or above MHHW (mean higher high water), a slough channel system did not evolve. The field analysis suggested that dredged material should not be placed higher than about 1.5 feet below MHHW in order for a natural tidal drainage system to evolve. The design of the Sonoma Baylands adopted this elevation as the maximum elevation for placement of dredged material, in order to promote natural evolution of the marsh after the dikes are breached. This initial low elevation will promote a progression of vegetation from cordgrass, pickleweed, and saltgrass, sediment accretion on the marshplain, and development of a slough channel system. Defining the maximum elevation to which dredged material may be placed will ensure

evolution of the geomorphic features, tidal hydrology, and ecosystem functions of a natural marsh.

Using dredged material to raise the elevation of the baylands before the dikes are breached and then relying on natural estuarine sedimentation processes to raise the marsh plain as a slough channel system and vegetation develop will accelerate the evolution of the tidal marsh ecosystem by several decades. Physical and biologic monitoring of the Sonoma Baylands restoration project will add to our knowledge of the physical criteria for tidal marsh restoration using dredged material.

boundaries; and 3) discussing current problems, issues and solutions in all facets of planning.
