GIS Applications for Planning: BAAMA Technical Tour

NSCCAPA is co-sponsoring this event with BAAMA, the Bay Area Automated Mapping Association, which is a chapter of URISA, the Urban and Regional Information Systems Association. The tour will feature presentations of GIS applications being used at UC Berkeley and San Jose State University to solve problems of land use management, emergency response, strategic planning, and socio-economic equity conditions of ethnic groups. Presentations will be followed by a demonstration of the tools and technology being used.

Prof. John Radke will describe an alternative approach to emergency response: the use of GIS to plan and manage strategies for fighting fires in the East Bay hills.

Prof. John Landis is updating the Futures 2000 project, where GIS is being used for urban spatial analysis and presentation graphics.

Prof. Robert Twiss will describe GIS for multiagency planning: the SF Bay/Delta example, with GIS modeling of the 14-county area for regional planning and management.

Prof. Earl Bossard will describe the use of PC-based GIS and spreadsheet systems to analyze census data for assessment of the housing and transportation needs of specific ethnic minorities.

Ken Gardels is updating Sequoia 2000, a \$1.5 million research effort to construct a database management system for handling spacial data.

It's easy, and you get all kinds of great stuff." Then you can loan them your copy of the Northern News and show them what a great newsletter they'll get, and all of the events they could be going to if only they knew about them. (Of course,

they might balk at the dues, and you don't want to tell them about all of the other "junk" mail they'll be getting. But hey, "no pain, no gain,")

Seriously, though, the APA is the only professional organization for those involved in the planning field. You may belong to other groups that focus on resource management, urban design, transportation, economic development, and other specialties, and that's great, but where do you turn when you want to know what's going on locally, state-wide, or nationally in the *planning* field?

Likewise, your non-APA co-workers, friends, and employers may be great at what they do, but wouldn't they be even better at it if they were tuned in to the professional discussions and trends through APA? Besides, you get to go to great conferences like the one in San Francisco!

Ad Hoc Ethics Committee Available for Northern Section Planners

on Bradley, AICP, has been offering workshops and encouraging APA members to become certified by the American Institute of Certified Planners for several years here in the Northern Section, and elsewhere around the nation before that. The local results have been remarkable, with a high pass rate and increased professional awareness and standing.

A major responsibility of those who are "AICP" is adherence to the Ethical Principles, Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct, and Advisory Rulings. These three elements identify a planner's constituents and responsibilities, as well as offer practical advice and guidance in particular situations. However, the standards are not static, but require aspiration and continuous effort to achieve. APA members and others involved in the planning process are also encouraged to abide by these standards.

Northern Section has recently established a local ethics committee that will be available to answer questions about the code,

offer advice for particular situations planners may find themselves in, and to review complaints. For instance, there may be questions about the occasional conflict between a client and a public interest group an individual is volunteering with. Situations may arise where an individual is not sure of the professional standards that might apply, due to the influence of political and economic factors. There may also be cases where a co-worker appears to be using the AICP designation incorrectly, or is misrepresenting co-workers or others. Each of these could be addressed informally at the local level by the Ad Hoc Ethics Committee.

Don Bradley, AICP and June Catalano, AICP will be the primary contact people on the Northern Section's Ad Hoc Ethics Committee. Their names and phone numbers will continue to be listed in the Directory, on page 2 of the *Northern News*, for future reference. Please note: this committee is not intended to replace the role of the AICP Executive Director, Ethics Committee and Commission, in Washington, DC. The formal channels for seeking advice, rulings, and review of complaints will continue to be in effect.

Resolving Land Use Disputes: Negotiation and Facilitation Skills and Training for Planners and Planning Officials

This 3½ hour session will be an interactive training experience designed to leave attendees with concrete negotiation and dispute resolution skills. Facilitation and consensus building is currently employed by many jurisdictions for a variety of projects. This seminar will give you basic knowledge of what dispute resolution is, of using facilitation to reconcile divergent points of view, pre-empt stifling disagreements, and how to use mediation techniques to respond to confliction positions. The session is produced by Susan Quinn, the director of the Center for Municipal Dispute Resolution operating from the University of San Diego Law School. The Center has worked extensively with the City of San Diego in its update of the Zoning Code and with its historic site preservation task force, and has provided training at the League of California Cities Planners Institute. Thursday morning, October 20, 8:30 A.M. to 12:00 noon. \$75.

Merging Onto the Information Superhighway: Innovations in the Use of Information Systems for Planners

This 4 hour seminar will focus on new frontiers in the use of information systems in the planning field. Geographic information systems, PC based information systems, and other new innovations in the field will be explored. Policy issues associated with gaining access to the "information superhighway" will be discussed, as well as the computerization of permitting systems and customer service programs. This seminar is sponsored by the California Planning Foundation which annually sponsors a seminar at the state conference providing cutting edge topics and perspectives. Ray Bradbury, a distinguished science fiction writer and no alien to the world of planning will be the keynote lunch speaker. Mr. Bradbury was the idea consultant and wrote the basic scenario for the U.S. Pavilion at the 1964 N.Y. World's Fair, he conceived metaphors for Spaceship Earth, EPCOT, Disney World, and contributed to the conception of the Orbitron space ride for EuroDisney in France. During the 80's he was creative consultant at the Jerde Partnership, the architectural firm that blueprinted the Glendale Galleria, the Westside Pavilion, and Horton Plaza. Award-Winning Miles Inc. Master Plan Projects **Underway**

Lyndon/Buchanan Associates were designers, in collaboration with GEZ Architects/ Engineers, for two recently completed projects at Miles Inc. in Berkeley: A 13,000 square-foot research and development facility and a 20,000 square-foot pharmaceutical production facility. Lyndon/Buchanan Associates, in collaboration with Life Sciences International, also designed two pharmaceutical production facilities either nearing completion or in the construction documents phase, totalling 150,000 square feet.

These are the initial major building projects undertaken on the site since Miles adopted a Master Plan and Design Guidelines prepared by Lyndon/Buchanan Associates for the company's 30-acre facility in Berkeley, as part of the Development Agreement between Miles and the City of Berkeley, which received a 1992 Urban Design Award of Excellence from the American Institute of Architects.

Locally Designed Christmas Cards to be Offered By the Museum of Modern Art

Robert Sabbatini, AICP, ASLA, is pleased to announce that his design for a Christmas card will be available this year from the Museum of Modern Art, New York. At Sasaki Associates, Inc. in San Francisco, he is responsible for the California State University, Monterey Bay campus master plan and phase I improvements Located on 1,300 acres at Fort Ord, the CSUMB campus is the first phase of the conversion of the 20,000-acre military base to public and private uses. Participating on the CSUMB master plan are his partners Nelson Scott Smith, AIA and Owen Lang, ASLA.

Monopoly In the Park Opens in San Jose

Residents will now be able to take a ride on the Reading, pass GO, and collect two hundred dollars, on a life-sized granite game board amidst a beautiful park setting. In a highly touted design competition spearheaded by the non-profit "Friends of San Jose Beautiful," the Costa Mesa-based landscape planning and design firm NUVIS was selected from among 14 entrants to design the city's anxiously-awaited "Monopoly in the Park." NUVIS was selected because they were best able to capture the whimsical nature of the project. Picnic benches will feature built-in Monopoly Boards, while elements of the game will also be incorporated into park benches, topiary walls, and landscape design. The game will also provide sponsorship opportunities for local businesses, enabling the city to collect necessary maintenance fees for the park and game board. The actual 30 square-foot granite game board was designed and built by Cypress Granite and Memorials.

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
