# Supporting California Parks: New Directions in Park Funding

### State Parks

eterioration in State parks has become an all too common experience. In the past year, news reports have highlighted worsening conditions at such notable parks as Jack London, San Juan Bautista, Hearst Castle, and Angel Island. The problems are wide-ranging and include everything from structural weaknesses in buildings, disintegration of the landscape, and basic maintenance and repair needs.

Deterioration is the direct result of deferred maintenance over the last ten years, which became a necessary evil in the face of budget cuts at the State level. Also, budget cuts caused the State's Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) to reduce the total number of park rangers and maintenance staff. Such staffing cuts have left park rangers hard pressed to maintain sites, provide educational services, and work on habitat restoration projects. While funding has been slashed, the number of annual park visitors continued to increase to 70 million by mid-1999.

Funding of State parks is a particularly important issue in the Northern Section. Of the approximately 270 State parks throughout California, more than 33 percent are found in the Bay Area or the North Coast. Another 20 percent are found in the Central Coast. When park funding is cut at the State level, those of us living in the Northern Section directly witness the negative impacts.

Governor Davis recently signed AB 18, a \$2.1 billion park bond measure that would appear on the March 2000 ballot. The last parks and wildlife resource bond was Proposition 70 for \$776 million and was approved by voters in 1988. A bill comparable to AB

18 originated in the State Senate as SB 57 and would have placed a bond measure on the November 2000 ballot. Action on SB 57 is less likely now that AB 18 was passed and signed.

AB 18 would provide approximately \$545 million to DPR for improvements to State parks. This dollar amount would partially pay for the estimates \$1 billion price tag for park rehabilitation. Prior to passage of the 1999-2000 State Budget, DPR estimated deferred maintenance needs and capital outlay projects in State parks to be about \$549 million. Costs related to the development and protection of natural and cultural resources were estimated to exceed \$500 million. The State Budget provided about \$137 million for deferred maintenance and \$20 million for cultural and natural heritage projects.

The California State Parks System is comprised of about 1.3 million acres, nearly one percent of the State's total land area. It includes 280 miles of coastline; 625 miles of lake and river frontage; nearly 18,000 campsites; 1,455 historic buildings; and 3000 miles of trails. State parks include sensitive habitats, threatened or endangered species, and historic or archaeological sites.

## Local Parks

While State parks have received intense media attention, local parks have not, even though many of them suffer from some of the same deferred maintenance problems. This is particularly an issue in older and inner city communities, where the local jurisdiction is usually the entity responsible for park upkeep. By way of comparison,

cities in rural and semi-rural areas that are experiencing new large-scale development on greenfield sites often require developers to provide new parks and contribute to park maintenance.

In San Francisco, for example, a recent survey found that parks and community centers require extensive repairs. These repairs could cost as much as \$320 million. Also, some neighborhoods were found to be particularly lacking in park space, clubhouses, playgrounds, and other facilities and would require investment for the creation of new parks. The City's Mission District and the rapidly growing South of Market neighborhood are widely known to have a smallest amount of park space.

The problem with local park funding is that cities are limited in their allowable funding mechanisms. Voters approved Proposition 218 in November 1996, which raised the threshold for local parks and open space funding by requiring a two-thirds vote for the creation of special assessment districts. Also, with the establishment of the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) in the early 1990s to fund schools, local governments have less discretionary funding available for parks.

San Francisco is considering a variety of strategies for funding its parks needs, including expansion of user fees, solicitation of federal, State, and private money, and development of revenue-generating facilities, like skating rinks and sports centers. Mayor Willie Brown has proposed a \$100

million bond measure to supplement other strategies.

AB 18, the State Parks bond measure, would include substantial funding for local parks and is intended to target disadvantaged neighborhoods in urban areas. In fact, AB 18 originated almost entirely as a park funding bill for poor inner-city communities, and funding for State parks was only added in the amendment process.

The bill would allocate funding to the Roberti Z'berg Harris parks program, which distributes funds to underserved communities with a high incidence of crime. Under an earlier version of the bill, funding would have also been allocated to the Murray Hayden parks program (currently pending as SB 74). The definition of "urban" under the Roberti Z'berg Harris program is so broad that it now fits the vast majority of California cities. The Murray Hayden formula would have focused on poverty-stricken urban neighborhoods with more critical parks needs.

Therefore, funding needs for local parks, particularly in inner city areas, would not be thoroughly addressed through AB 18. Given the provisions of the park measure, and given that cities are limited in their potential funding strategies for parks, inner city neighborhoods may continue to experience park deficiencies unless new funding strategies are developed.


